2021 IN REVIEW

PRESIDENT'S REPORT ROBYN PALLAS

2021 brought continuing challenges locally and globally as a result of COVID-19 and its impact. Orienteering was affected as were all sports. Enthusiasm for orienteering, the efforts of many to move yet again to new arrangements and practices, and further government financial support have kept our sport vigorous.



Orienteering NSW has grown in size and in complexity over its 50-year history, particularly in the past decade. It is both a sporting association and a business.

In 2021 with the assistance of consultants experienced in working with not-for-profit organisations, the Board began looking deeply at ONSW as organisation; this work is the basis of ongoing action being taken for ONSW to have a strong future.

I would like to acknowledge in particular these 2021 outcomes:

- Delivery across NSW of nearly a full calendar of events despite COVID-19 interruptions thanks to the efforts of clubs and their event organisers
- Nea and Ewan Shingler were selected in the Australian team for the junior world championships, which did not participate due to COVID-19
- A very active Junior Squad program led by Squad Manager Helen O'Callaghan and her team, in spite of COVID-19 restrictions and cancellations and the disappointment for the Schools Team when the Australian Orienteering Championships were cancelled
- Approval of a reviewed and renewed ONSW Constitution at the August Special General Meeting following the work of Director Robert Spry and his working group
- An engaged and committed Board supported by comprehensive position papers, wellstructured board meetings, and attendance from any location via Zoom has enabled substantial board engagement with ONSW governance and management (active participation by all Board members and the work of Secretary Mary Jane Mahony was essential in this)
- Very significant investment of time by Finance Director Melanie Christie supported by judicious investment from the NSW Sport & Recreation Recovery grant has ensured that ONSW's financial system and reports are comprehensive, transparent, timely and understandable
- Support for event organisers through establishment of an event cancellation policy to inform competitors and standardise cancellation administration
- Support for event organisers through the development of a written agreement model for clubs collaborating on the organisation and delivery of orienteering events

Orienteering could not develop as a sport nor prosper today without the contributions of many. In 2021 there was external recognition of the long (approaching 50 years) and extensive contributions of three ONSW members:

• Dave Lotty (Uringa) was inducted into the Orienteering Australia Hall of Fame.

• Basil and Jean Baldwin (Goldseekers) were awarded the 2021 Sport NSW Distinguished Long Service Award for Orienteering.

Looking ahead

The ONSW strategic plan is under review and a major focus for the ONSW board in 2022 is setting priorities for 2022. Committees are being formed to involve a wider range of ONSW members in governance and operational matters. This will ensure we develop and deliver a strong sport for the future. Committees already established are the Finance Committee and the Awards committee.

In conclusion

I would like to thank my fellow board members for their support and efforts in 2021 to keep our sport operating well. Thank you also to all NSW clubs and members for your continued support of orienteering in 2021 through both your organisation and your understanding in another difficult year.

OBJECTIVE 1

Create community

Enhance lives of our community

- Providing quality and enjoyable events
 - Course Setter of the Year surveys collected feedback on State League events (including two events carried over from 2020).
 - The ONSW central event calendar supported planning orienteering events across the state to minimise event clashes and maximise participation in a COVID-19 impacted year.
 - World Orienteering Day (May) featured events in Newcastle and Sydney (Manly Vale and Castle Hill).
- Utilising social media
 - $\circ\quad$ 3-5 weekly posts on ONSW's Facebook page
 - Active post sharing between the OA Facebook page and the ONSW Facebook page (in both directions).
 - \circ 1,600 people like the ONSW Facebook page (up from 1,513 at the end of 2020).
 - \circ 13 clubs in NSW have active public Facebook pages and one has a closed group page.
 - Other non-club Facebook pages established to target particular participation communities (e.g. the 31-year-old Sydney Summer Series with over 600 followers, the newer River & Bay Series with 75 followers)
 - Weekly ONSW Members e-bulletin and fortnightly non-members e-bulletin were both reported to engage recipients above industry averages.
 - \circ $\;$ $\;$ Increased number of NSW contributions to the monthly OA e-Newsletters.
 - o Items in the *The Australian Orienteer* magazine online edition promoted in NSW.
- Working with clubs
 - An executive e-bulletin is sent to club executives and delegates after each Board meeting (eleven editions)
 - Location is no longer a barrier with online communication (Zoom, Teams) increasingly used for formal meetings (e.g. association general meetings) and specific topic conversations (e.g. finance, membership, matters).
 - The Association's Annual General Meeting (April) and General Meeting (August), both held by Zoom, well attended with nearly full representation of club delegates, and an updated Constitution approved.

- Using technology to create a buzz
 - Training and development are increasingly offered via Zoom or Teams enabling more people to take part.
 - Pre-entry on Eventor is now normal and enables participants to know who else is competing.
 - Contactless entry and payment are now normalised for most onsite registration processes.
 - Online splits and Livelox, plus live results, allowed same-day feedback on performance.
 - Sydney Summer Series statistical analysis by Richard Pattison generated wide-ranging comment.
- Utilising volunteering and creating a sense of community
 - Specific purpose Zoom meetings with club representatives provide a forum for exchanging ideas, practices and 'putting a name to a face'.
 - Volunteers were recognised both by ONSW (p11) and by other organisations (p6)
- Coaching to create enjoyment
 - Coach training for schools programs (Level 0 accreditation) was mainly conducted through innovative use of remote teaching approaches (using Zoom).
 - More teachers accredited as Level 0 coaches due to use of remote teaching approaches.

OBJECTIVE 2

Grow participation

To see more people on more maps in more regions on more occasions

- Make access easier
 - Online event registration and payment now well established for both members and casuals.
 - Electronic payment for enter-on-the day event registration now widely used.
 - Season tickets remained high for a third year for the Sydney Summer Series (in spite of COVID-19 disruption to the season program).
- Convert newcomers
 - Newcomers registering as casuals in Eventor are added to the fortnightly casuals ebulletin list. Clubs continue to welcome casuals in many ways.
- Create exposure
 - Permanent courses were opened at Cockatoo Island and West Pymble.
 - Clubs increasingly add short 'Mini' courses to their summer series events for children, newcomers and the less able safe, easily navigated and visible to the community.
 - Public media exposure increased.
 - Some 'demonstration' events held in spite of COVID-19 limitations (e.g. Uringa Seniors Festival event).

ONSW AWARDS

President's Award – Helen O'Callaghan (Bush n Beach)

When Bush 'n' Beach first started, Helen put her hand up at the meeting to establish the club and has not brought that hand down in the role of secretary. She also brought hubby Tony (an experienced and well-performed orienteer) and their four boys, all of whom have gone on to

perform well at State level.

Helen is a great communicator, especially with those new to the sport. When 'newbies' turn up at the registration table at an event, Helen goes out of her way to ensure that they are welcome and understand the concepts.

She is very passionate about getting juniors involved in orienteering. She has held a number of introductory courses, training and events for juniors at schools and over the school holidays (using the Active Kids vouchers). Helen has almost single-



handedly contacted schools and offered her services and expertise.

Helen is considered the consummate secretary. Agendas are well prepared, and her minutes are always accurate. She is a motivator and is highly organised. Helen has almost single-handedly contacted schools in the Coffs Harbour area and offered her services and expertise.

In 2020 Helen was appointed manager of the NSW Junior Squad and she set about doing the job with gusto, developing many initiatives. She has initiated and developed many things for the Juniors including Zoom coaching sessions and a zoom competition for the Juniors to keep them motivated during COVID-19 lockdowns. This included organising a shirt for all NSW juniors to make them feel part of a team and a week-long camp at Easter involving Juniors and their families with many fun activities and interesting speakers.

When it came to hosting and organising larger events, such as QB3 and the Waterfall Way Weekend (in conjunction with NTOC), again it was Helen at the forefront. She took these events on with enthusiasm and the events ran like clockwork.

President's Junior Award – Nea Shingler (Big Foot)

In the six months available for competition, Nea made a massive impact. At just 16 years old - and giving away four years to some rivals - she was the Junior Women's National League Champion for 2021 and selected in the team for the Junior World Orienteering Championships.

In the State League Point Score competition she won W20A. She was also on the verge of winning the Australian Orienteering 3-Days for junior elite women at Easter until an unfortunate error on the last day at Gumble.

She is already an emerging coach, gaining experience as part of the Bold Horizons SOS crew, and helping coach newcomers at the first Moonlight Madness event in April (a fundraiser for the NSW junior squad).

Club of the Year – Bennelong Northside Orienteers

In the year our oldest club (and the oldest constituted club in Australia) turned 50, they were the lead club in putting on a superb Easter carnival with demanding courses on challenging terrain.

And they had to do all the preparation leg work twice due to covid forcing us to postpone the carnival from 2020 to 2021.

In doing so they unveiled a lovely new granite map (Noah's Ark Ridge) to complement the intimidatingly awesome Gumble map.

Back in Sydney, they also produced four new or updated maps (with four courses on each map) for the MapRun app for people to orienteer on during lockdown.

A massive effort in a crazy year. Curiously, this is the first time they have won this award.

Rookie of the Year – John Fitzsimmons (SHOO)

John has been an enthusiastic member of SHOO for two years, taking an active part in club events, Metro League and State League.

This year he won Men's Open B in the Orienteer of the Year and was SHOO's leading point scorer in Division 3 of the MetrO League.

In his first State League on a Hard course he won – at Newcastle for the QBIII carnival. This year he has really extended his understanding of the sport, maps and his physical ability.

He is an active member of SHOO always there to put out or bring in controls. He is taking a great deal of interest in course setting and has asked to set a SHOO Summer Saturdays in 2022. He has a very positive attitude and is well liked by all SHOOites.

Encouragement Award (Cox's Cup) – Barbara Dawson (Garingal)

Barbara is a whirlwind of positivity, whether coaching in schools or at local events.

She is one of our most important coaches working in schools, where she is always encouraging the students to have fun - and to come along to club events.

She has been a stalwart at the River and Bay Orienteering Series (a joint Uringa and Illawarra Kareelah activity) as the lead coach for newcomers. At events she's always quick to approach newcomers, check everything is in hand and let them know of the opportunities to do more. She has helped other club members to learn what works when helping first-timers.

She was ONSW's rep on OA's working group on the revamped primary schools kit, and in 2019 was named Volunteer of the Year along with husband Graeme.

Volunteer of the Year – Friends of The Hut (various clubs)

It's a safe bet that very few people are aware of this year's winner, yet every orienteer knows of their work!

Belanglo House – affectionately known as The Hut - has been an ONSW asset leased from NSW Forestry Corporation since 1979. With the 2020-2021 COVID 19 pandemic, the Hut has been unavailable to members.

Our winners – very much unsung heroes - look after this valued resource for training and events, and on a regular basis continue to make sure everything is well looked after. It may include:

- general maintenance
- complete painting of rooms
- collecting and splitting firewood
- grass cutting, weed removal and spraying noxious weeds.

The team includes Kev Curby (manager), Peter Howe (occasional caretaker extraordinaire), Luke and Chris Wilmott, Dave Lotty, Ron Junghans, Barry Pearce, Doug and Simone Jay, Hugh Cameron, Chris Murphy and Len Minty.

A long-standing incentive is free accommodation in the Hut for one year following participation in a weekend working bee.

Course Setter of the Year – Anna Fitzgerald (Goldseekers)

Anna was lauded for her courses at Gumble on the last day of the Australian Orienteering Carnival at Easter.

They provided a heady contrast: fast open, rocky farmland for the first half of her courses - then sent everyone plunging back into the intricate granite that had proven so difficult the previous day.


It's the first time in seven years the award has gone to a 'full length' bush event, after being dominated by Sprint setters in recent times.

CLUB HIGHLIGHTS

Bennelong Northside Orienteers Inc

- 50th Anniversary of the club was celebrated at a magnificent function at Balgowlah RSL in December. The organising team of Katherine Cameron, Linda Mandin, Sharon Lambert and Peter Hopper ensured the celebration was an outstanding success.
- Club of the Year for 2021, the first time Bennelong has been awarded this trophy, was announced at the 50th Anniversary function.
- Easter 2020/2021 with great challenging courses was held on Bennelong maps at Noahs Ark Ridge and Gumble Pinnacles. Goldseekers and Central Coast combined with Bennelong Northside to organise the carnival. The 2020 carnival was postponed due to COVID-19 restrictions.
- Day 4 of the Xmas 5-Days was held on the Wattle Ridge map. This was also postponed from 2020 when COVID-19 restrictions prevented the carnival from going ahead. The map had thickened up considerably during the 12-month postponement making the courses more difficult than originally planned.
- Richard Pattison continues to produce new maps for the club. He also produces statistics and commentary on the Sydney Summer Series each week which makes the competitor experience more enjoyable.

Big Foot Orienteering Club Inc

- Siblings Ewan and Nea Shingler were named in the Australian JWOC Honour Team.
- Big Foot were relatively lucky in our 40th year: we were able to squeeze in a State League at Wattle Ridge in March as well as the Big Foot Sprints in December.
- Wattle Ridge was particularly memorable for the preceding torrential rain; many were unfortunately unable to attend, but we were impressed with those who did have their runs in damp conditions that had eased.
- During the winter lockdown some members were able to do some bush training in their LGA.

Bush n Beach Orienteering Club Inc

- Club powerhouse Helen O'Callaghan won the ONSW President's Award.
- All four Woolford boys were selected in the NSW Schools Orienteering Team.
- Combined with Northern Tablelands to put on the Waterfall Way Weekend.

Central Coast Orienteers Inc

- Easter 2021 (delayed from 2020 due to COVID-19) very successful Easter carnival with great courses, great commentary. Provided innovative string course maze day 2 course and map for day 2 and 3. Nick Dent, Ron Pallas (CC life member) and Hilary Wood all heavily involved.
- Combined with Uringa to run NSW Middle and Long Championships at Ben Bullen State Forest.
- Continued our summer series, albeit with lower numbers; we have encouraged newer members to set courses
- Enthusiastic uptake of online entry due to COVID-19

Garingal Orienteers Inc

- The highlight of the year was the very successful 2020 (held in 2021) NSW Middle and Long Distance Championships at Eugowra. We are very grateful to the team of Rod Eckels, Barbara Hill, Graeme Dawson, Tony Hill and James Lithgow who travelled the long distances yet again after the 2020 postponement just a few weeks short of the original dates.
- Membership at the end of 2021 stood at 265, quite a large number of whom solely enter Summer Series and/or local events.
- After sadly farewelling computer gurus Col Burnett and Di Bergen to their new home in Adelaide, we have transitioned to using SI Timing event software.
- Ross Barr (M75A) is Club Champion, Anneke Corry (W14) got the Club Encouragement Award and Nick Stanley (M16) the Most Improved Junior Award. Johnny Petersen was awarded the Silver Hare, a perpetual trophy donated by Moira Whiteside to recognise service to Garingal.
- David Bray has empowered Garingal with a free Google Workspace account that will revolutionise our document storage and access rights. David has also created the skeleton of a new GO webpage using the WiX platform which is proving excitingly easy to use.

Goldseekers Orienteers Inc

- Organised the Sprint Prologue and Family Relays at CSU Orange campus as part of the 2021 National Easter Carnival.
- A successful street series in February 2021.
- Good start to the club bush series until COVID-19 restrictions were introduced.
- Conducted a 6-week orienteering program for the Orange Anglican Grammar School and mapped St Raphael's College in Cowra.
- Increased number of people capable of organising club events.

Hastings Orienteering Group Inc

- First Junior Sprint Series event held in December, which encouraged children to compete on their own in a traffic-free area and develop map reading and navigational skills. Well supported and received great feedback
- Newcastle Orienteering Club provided valuable mentoring for State League event (postponed to 2022).
- 31 members in 2021.
- Purchased banners and flags via council grant to promote the club.
- Facebook page continues to be well followed and engaged with 630 followers.

Illawarra Kareelah Orienteers Inc

- Bought a defibrillator and trained members in its use.
- Unveiled 2 new urban maps (Little Bay and Berry).
- Hosted a Xmas 5-Days event.
- Steve Holloway conducted two Sporting Schools programs.
- Good coverage of events in local newspapers (South Coast Register, Narooma News).
- Followed up casuals by email to notify them of future events.

Newcastle Orienteering Club Inc

- Won the ONSW Interclub Trophy for State League events.
- Club meetings have successfully continued in video format.
- The 2020 initiative of using MapRun for summer street orienteering has continued for the 2021-2022 series. This was also used successfully as a COVID-19-safe way of orienteering when lockdowns were decreased allowing for individual participation in orienteering events
- For the second consecutive year we had a shortened Newcastle Orienteer of the Year season with everyone successfully adapting to this
- The BOSS (Bike Orienteering Summer Season) and other MTBO events have been interrupted, however plans are in hand for these to progress in the near future,
- A successful 2021 QBIII was held over the June long weekend.

Northern Tablelands Orienteering Club Inc

- Website had a makeover thanks to Maurice Anker and increased Facebook presence thanks to Erica Smith.
- Combined with Bush n Beach to stage the Waterfall Way weekend in March, which brought street orienteering to the community of Dorrigo.
- Successfully conducted the 'boring' AGM in a new format by inviting members to a pub dinner!
- Due to COVID-19 had to cancel the Armidale school championships, but reinstated our November twilight park orienteering series using MapRun.

Southern Highlands Orienteers Inc

- We ran the NSW Sprint Championships on our updated WSU Macarthur map. It was held under very trying conditions, both in terms of weather (flooding rain) and complying with the University's COVID-19 protocols. Another great effort from Stephan Wagner and everyone else involved
- John Fitzsimmons won the ONSW Rookie of the Year Award and we had 10 juniors receive ONSW Junior Participation Awards
- A club is only as good as its volunteers, and we have the best. Thank you to the SHOO executive and other volunteers who make our events such a success under very trying, pandemic induced, conditions.

Uringa Orienteers Inc

- Returned to orienteering after lockdown with the NSW Middle and Long Distance Championships at Lidsdale in November in collaboration with Central Coast Orienteers.
- Welcomed new course setters, first aiders and community coaches.
- Ran events for the NSW Seniors Festival, Sydney Summer Series, Metro League plus put on 5 River Bay Series events in collaboration with IKO and the Stingers.
- Provided coaching support for several School Sporting Schools programs.
- Applied for affiliation with the NSW Companion Card program to encourage people with disability that need a carer to participate in club events.

Wagga and Riverina Occasional Orienteers

- Although interrupted by COVID-19 restrictions, WaggaRoos managed to conduct 80% of its scheduled event calendar. This included the annual Interclub Challenge against Albury-Wodonga, a very successful 10th running of the Riverina Schools Orienteering Day, and the annual WaggaRoos club Training Weekend.
- Following a continual decline in attendances at the WaggaRoos Summer Series streetorienteering series over the past few years, WaggaRoos tried MapRun as a means of revitalising interest and increasing participation.
- Our bush events attract three times as many participants as street events, suggesting that it is the forest that attracts local orienteering.
- Initial steps were undertaken to incorporate the club.

Western and Hills Orienteers Inc

- Three members selected in the NSW Junior team. These were three different members from those selected in the 2019 team (no team selected in 2020), highlighting WHO's current strength in the junior ranks.
- Active encouragement of first-time course setters and getting juniors involved in events is a great thing for the long term.
- We have welcomed some new members despite the pandemic disruptions to events.
- Paperless and cashless registration processes developed due to COVID-19 are now well
 established and here to stay. This has resulted in a much simpler and accurate system for both
 participant and volunteer.



CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

As outlined in the ONSW Constitution, the ONSW Board is elected at the Annual General Meeting. Duties of the Board include administering and managing the affairs of ONSW, to report regularly to members on achievements and to oversee the pursuit of strategic objectives endorsed by ONSW.

ONSW BOARD

The ONSW Board met twelve times in 2021 via Zoom.

2021 was the last year for which all board members were elected to one-year terms of office. Following the approval of the revised Constitution in August 2021 a transition to two-year terms of office will commence in 2022.

ENGAGEMENT WITH ORIENTEERING AUSTRALIA

OA, as with ONSW, has moved to remote technology-supported meetings with the exception of the 2021 OA Annual General Meeting.

The Annual General Meeting was held in person in Molong, NSW, during the Australian 3-Days at Easter, and was attended by delegates Robyn Pallas and Robert Spry, with other ONSW members present.

Online meetings have enabled more members of the ONSW Board as well as other ONSW members to attend OA workshops and meetings, including occasional consultations and the traditional end of year workshops.

FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT MELANIE CHRISTIE

ONSW is currently solvent and able to pay its bills.

Principal Activities

Orienteering NSW Inc. is a State Sporting Organisation. The principal activities of ONSW are to act for, on behalf of and for the benefit of members in the promotion of the sport of orienteering in NSW. No significant changes to the principal activities of ONSW occurred during the reporting period.

Tax and Dividends

ONSW is exempt from paying income tax under section 50-10 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act, 1997.* ONSW does not pay dividends and its income and property are applied solely towards the promotion of its objects.

The Association is registered with the Australian Tax Office (ATO) for GST. With gross receipts exceeding \$250,000, ONSW is classified as a Tier 1 association and is required to submit audited financial statements each year to members at the AGM.

Results

The results show a surplus for the financial year of \$20,855, which is a decrease from the surplus of \$53,592 in the previous financial year. As the surplus of 2020 was a direct result of COVID-related government support, so the surplus of 2021 reflects the decreased government support in 2021. A second COVID shutdown in 2021 greatly affected ONSW's revenue, particularly from the Sporting Schools program as well as that raised from Clubs via running events.

Despite the continued uncertainty in the operating landscape during 2021, it was the contributions, dedication and commitment of the Orienteering family that remained wonderfully solid.

Achievements and Highlights in 2021

In order to better serve ONSW's members and improve clarity and transparency, the accounts have been restructured. This means that more granular detail may be extracted from the data, be it information about Sporting Schools, Belanglo House or various series. Funds for the Junior Squad, Schools Team and Stingers are now more clearly marked. Information can be more easily extracted through the introduction of cost centres.

Other financial improvements have involved the simplification of procedures and guidelines for the use of ONSW's accounts. Whilst a security concern precipitated the cessation of support for POLi services through Eventor, the reduction in processing complexity has further improved back-end processes.

The introduction of more stringent financial controls and tracking means that costs are put against the event or series that incurred them, allowing for better budgeting and financial oversight.

The ongoing simplification spilled over into the physical space, when it was discovered that few members actually wanted the goods in ONSW's storage box. The tidy-up resulted in several clubs obtaining useful items for never-to-be-seen-again prices. Closing this unwanted storage unit has saved ONSW over \$1,200 per year in rental costs.

2021 continued the trend of clubs deciding to manage their own financial affairs. Additional clubs have acquired or begun the process of acquiring their own PayPal accounts, bringing the total to eight. ONSW thanks those clubs that have made this decision, as it means funds are received instantly by the club and reduces double handling of funds and therefore the chance of error. In addition, it minimises the amount of data transmitted, protecting members' information from external parties.

This year also saw another financial innovation for orienteering: the introduction of refund polices for most events. This was a direct response to pandemic and weather-based cancellations. 2021 also saw the successful introduction of a formal financial agreement between ONSW and event organisers. These have brought clarity and stability for organisers, participants and ONSW, particularly in such uncertain times as orienteering finds itself today.

Grants

Grants, particularly those from the NSW Office of Sport, continue to be a major source of funding for both short and longer-term projects.

The Sport and Recreation Support grant (received in 2020 with two years to expend it) was offered to clubs for any project within the grant guidelines. This has been used for new equipment purchases, upgrading of old equipment (particularly jettisoning noisy, toxic generators for quiet lithium batteries) and compensation for COVID-induced double expenses where significant events had to be postponed. Funds were also used to assist with purchasing IOF-standard MTBO control units, which have been put to good use, notably at the Australian MTBO Champs this year.

A pilot project is underway to improve the orienteering experience in schools by introducing the printing of results for all events. The data for this project continues to be collected, due to the COVID-induced shutdowns in schools during 2021.

The remaining funds are being expended for improving the functions of ONSW, with a focus on the long-term sustainability of the organisation.

ONSW also received \$20,000 (ex GST) from the NSW Office of Sport through its Sport Development Grant program. This grant is to be used explicitly for the development of Board members, coaches and trainers for the advancement of the sport by upskilling officials. In 2021, these grant monies were offered to select coaches for various courses, and more broad support offered for those who wished to learn more about mentoring others. Board members undertook analysis and workshops to focus on how best to steer the sport of orienteering into the future. This reflection and support encouraged two members to invest their time and seek out more formal qualifications to improve their Board-level management skills. The management of ONSW as an association was assisted by acquiring access to a library of governance resources.

The Board is grateful to the NSW Office of Sport for the funds that enable projects such as these to be undertaken for the benefit of the sport of orienteering.

Event Levies and Sporting Schools

ONSW derives a significant source of income from event levies. The 2021 calendar year brought in over \$130,000 in levies, assisted by the successful running of the postponed 2020 Easter carnival. However, this amount is still noticeably less than a non-COVID year with a major event.

The other source of income for ONSW is brought in by the NSW Department of Education's Sporting Schools program. At only \$65,000 revenue, this was once again strongly impacted by the timing of 2021's COVID-induced shutdown.

Membership Revenue and Donations

ONSW is grateful for the continued support from members, despite the vagaries introduced by pandemics and extreme weather events. At over \$46,600, membership revenue was healthy.

2021 was a replay of 2020 in the donation space. Once again, COVID played havoc with many donors' fundraising activities. However, Uringa Orienteers is thanked for its continued annual support of the Schools Team, despite the COVID-19-related disappointments of 2021. These donations meant that parents did not have to shoulder the whole burden of a year with expenses but no actual competition to attend.

Belanglo House

The tireless efforts of the Friends of Belanglo House continue to serve the orienteering community. Whilst COVID prevented many orienteers staying at the Hut, the needs of the forestry workers supported the revenue generated by this unique and incredibly useful accommodation.

Major Expenses

The major costs for ONSW, as for any business, are salaries (~\$150,000). Additional major costs for orienteering include coaching and mapping expenses for Sporting Schools (mostly covered by income from the same and mostly in the form of personnel costs) and Orienteering Australia membership registration fees (~\$34,000) and levies (~\$30,000).

2022 and beyond

ONSW is looking forward to building on the success of the last year and reporting on the fruits of other changes and innovations begun in 2021. We hope that 2022 brings us a year without lockdowns, pandemic-induced border closures, floods or bushfires. Considering all that the orienteering community has been through in the last two years, we have weathered it remarkably well. ONSW is keen to continue and expand actively supporting our volunteers who coach, officiate and run events now and into the future.

NSW BLUEBOTTLES

Orienteers are juniors up to the age of 20 in the calendar year ending 31 December.

2021 kicked off with some older juniors attending a NSW Stingers training camp based in Mittagong. It was a great opportunity for all to reconnect, fire up the orienteering brain and think about the season ahead.

The season started with a sense of normality with State League events in the Southern Highlands, and a huge week with the Easter Australian Orienteering Carnival, an Easter Egg fundraiser, and a junior training camp at the Canobolas Scout Camp near Orange and the NSW 2020 Champs.

Things started to feel even more 'normal' at the State League/National Orienteering League events at Broulee in May as juniors strived for selection to represent NSW at the Australian Schools Championships.

The squad was able to get back into its 'usual' fundraiser of catering at the QBIII weekend in the Newcastle area, offering delicious hot soup, home baked goodies and drinks. Some collective brainstorming and voting hatched the new squad name Bluebottles. Squad Manager Helen O'Callaghan set to work coordinating feedback on design proposals for a squad shirt. The juniors raced their hearts out and a week or so later, the Schools Team was announced.

Two camps were planned for the school holidays – one in NSW and a National Junior Training Camp at Stanthorpe – when everything came crashing down again and COVID-19 put us back into lockdowns and cancellations. The NSW camp was cancelled and only a handful of our juniors made it to Queensland, while our Sydney-based juniors entered an extended lockdown.

As a response to this, an online junior challenge started in August, with juniors allotted into teams of three to undertake a series of weekly challenges and connect via weekly zoom meetings. Each week there were physical and online challenges: long run, intervals, hill climbing, strength, Street View Orienteering, puzzles, Running Wild and more. Some then went on to perform very successfully in the Virtual Aus Champs hosted by Orienteering Australia.

The squad crept cautiously out of lockdown to compete at the 2021 NSW Championships in November, selling a few drinks for fundraising.

The year ended with a very successful training camp in December, hosted by the Mella Family, with a nice mix of training and social activities. Favourite activities included the sprint relay, firehoses, swimming, training, card games and the burning BBQ! Many juniors had great results at the Christmas 5-Days in the Southern Highlands to round out a mixed year of orienteering.

NSW STINGERS

Orienteers competing in the National Orienteering League (NOL), Australia's interstate competition for elite orienteers, represent New South Wales collectively as the Stingers.

Skills and fitness level rather than age determine whether an orienteer runs in an elite class. The NOL changed to a shorter four-round format in 2021. All up, 36 NSW orienteers were designated as Stingers in 2021, ranging in age from 14 to 59.

The Stingers are self-funding; funds raised are used to reduce the cost of competing for athletes. Although Covid-19 wiped out a third of the year they were able to contribute to the River and Bay Series, conducting one event and assisting across the series, and were responsible for one of the Xmas 5-Days events.

Nea Shingler won the junior women's division and Ewan Shingler was second.

ORIENTEERING IN SCHOOLS

Sporting Schools Programs

Sporting Schools is an Australian government-funded sporting program 'designed to help schools increase children's participation in sport and connect them with community sport opportunities'.

In 2021, despite the imposed lockdowns from COVID-19, the number of Sporting Schools programs totalled 50, surpassing the previous high of 44.

There has been a large increase in teacher professional development coach workshops via ZOOM leading to a reduction in the number of coach visits to schools. For teacher-led programs, participant and participations data are based on booked numbers rather than numbers confirmed by ONSW's sub-contracted coaches; consequently, year on year comparisons may not be appropriate.


