PRESIDENT'S REPORT - ROBYN PALLAS

2023 proved to be a very successful year for orienteering in NSW. I am very proud to be President of a very active orienteering community. I would like to acknowledge all the volunteers who contributed to another successful year of orienteering in NSW.

Highlights of the year included:

State League

A very successful State league Calendar was conducted in 2023. A big thank you to all the clubs and volunteers involved in making this possible. A sunny warm KB111 was enjoyed by all on the Central Coast and Newcastle. The use of a new map by Garingal at Rylstone "Breakfast Creek" provided very technical orienteering for our NSW Championships.

Sydney Sprint Weekend

An inaugural Sydney Sprint Weekend was held in March with several hundred competitors. This was part of the NOL calendar and proved for some exciting sprint races. Thank you to organiser Mark Shingler and all the volunteers who made this possible.

Club achievements

Several clubs reached milestones in their development. Western & Hills celebrated 40 years and Garingal celebrated 50 years. Congratulations on achieving these milestones.

NSW Awards

NSW awards were presented to several NSW members in gratitude for the volunteer work they do on behalf of their clubs and orienteering in NSW. A 50 year certificate was presented to several NSW members for their service and participation in orienteering in NSW for 50 years. Congratulations to all recipients of these awards.

2023 Xmas 5 Day

The 2023 Xmas 5 day was held on the Central Coast and provided varied orienteering to many orienteers from all over Australia and overseas. Two competitors from New Caledonia and several from Sweden also participated. The final day was exciting for diverse courses through the streets of Terrigal and across rock platforms. Perhaps the highlight of the day was the run, swim, run competition with many people choosing to participate.

NSW Schools Team

Our NSW Schools' Team was again successful in the Australian Schools Championships held in Western Australia. A strong team of 20 competed with several members being named in the Australian Honour Team. A big thank you to the managers and coaches who accompanied the team. This was a completely new management team and they need to be congratulated for undertaking this work on behalf of NSW. The team was Saffron Sweeney (manager), Andrew Dun (assistant manager), Lee Coady (coach) and Martina Craig (assistant coach).

Junior Squad

The Junior Squad has been strong this year with several successful camps being held. The Bluebottles are growing in numbers and again we thank the leadership of Helen O'Callaghan and all the parents who support the squad. Very successful fundraising was also held this year with the introduction of the Sports Foundation donation platform. Through this the Juniors received anonymous donations amounting to \$12,000.

National Integrity Framework

The National Integrity Framework continues to be rolled out across NSW clubs. All clubs have a Child Safety Officer and training is provided by NSW Child Safety Officer, Sandra Stewart. This is a high priority for all sports in NSW and Orienteering Australia is assisting states to fulfil it's obligations regarding the framework. Bennelong Northside Orienteers (BNN)



The year started with a challenging course set out at Diggers Beach set by Keelan Birch. 30 controls were hung taking orienteers up and over headlands and reserves on a scenic coastal map. Bruce Meder then led a fun Q&A style event at Jetty Foreshores, showing us that in the most popular areas, it is easy to get disorientated.

From May to November, Keelan organised a three part MapRun series at Tree Fern Creek in West Coffs. Several new families and old faces attended. Participants enjoyed finding small bush pockets in an urban area. A winter solstice night-O was tested at Brelsford Park, which was an enjoyable way to test night navigation in a sprint format. Our two other coastal maps at Sawtell and Woolgoolga also received some love with events in August and October.

Bruce Meder also set the sprint course at the NSW Mountain Bike Orienteering Champs at Coffs Harbour Education Campus. This was a fabulously designed sprint course and many commented on the excellent and well thought out planning.

NOL and International representation:

Sam Woolford won the individual competition in the junior category of the National Orienteering League, as well as being a part of the winning NSW team. He was subsequently selected to represent Australia at the Junior World Orienteering Championships in Romania. His results were: Sprint Distance 128th, Middle Distance 83rd, Long Distance 101st. Sam was also selected for the Australian Senior Team competing in Round 2 of the Orienteering World Cup in Czechia. He was 116th in the Long Distance and 121st in the Middle Distance.

Australian Schools Orienteering Championships

Club members Jamie and Alex Woolford were selected to represent NSW at ASOC, both being named in the Senior Boys team. Jamie was also named co-captain of this team. Jamie had excellent and consistent results in the competition and was named as one of 4 Senior Boys, from across the country, in the Schools Honour Team.

Central Coast Orienteers (CCN)

Presidents Report 2023-24.

Another good year of orienteering on the Central Coast and beyond. Our club members have a combined total of 805 event entries over the past 12 months within Australia. This is an increase from last year and does not include our members who venture further afield to New Zealand and Europe to compete in orienteering events there.

Central Coast has continued to provide the summer series and again participated in the Central Coast Lakes Festival with 2 events in 2023 at The Entrance and Davistown. The first was a bit of a wash out in torrential rain and as can be expected numbers were down with the hardy members braving the weather and inevitable wet feet. Davistown was beautiful weather and the combined numbers over the 2 events was 72 entries. We have had 220 entries in the summers series over the 11 events in the 2023-2024 season.

Earlier in the year the club along with Newcastle Orienteers held the Kings Birthday III weekend based around Olney State Forest, Richmond Vale and University of Newcastle -Callaghan campus. Colin Price set the Olney State League, controller was Hilary Wood. This event attracted 337 entrants from NSW and interstate and received good feedback for the quality of the course -setting. Well done Colin!

Although not officially a club event, as part of the organising team for 2024 Australian Orienteering Championships, a number of key people from Central Coast Orienteers and Newcastle Orienteers were involved in hosting the 2023 Xmas 5 days held on the Central Coast. This event attracted over 250 participants on each day and culminated in the last event being held at the Haven at Terrigal. The event was hosted by the AOC 2024 organising committee in order to raise additional funds for the Australian Orienteering Championship Carnival to be held in Armidale Sept 28-Oct 6 2024. Our club generously allowed the use of our maps free to help as well. I can report that the event surplus was over \$9000 and will help to defray mapping costs for the championships which are substantial. The event had the added bonus of showcasing orienteering in Terrigal CBD and in turn has attracted a couple of new members for our club!

We have also offered to Orienteering Australia to host the Oceania Sprint Championships in January 2026. If we are granted this event it will involve an individual sprint race, a 4 person relay race and a knock out sprint for the elite competitors from the Oceania region(mostly New Zealanders) but all orienteers can participate.

Membership numbers increased in 2023 to 54 members. Welcome to all our new and continuing members! Many thanks to all of you who have helped at our events over the last year and I hope to see you again soon.





Apart from this it all went off without a hitch, with big thanks to HOG and Macleay Valley MTB club for their assistance on the day.



Kicking off early on 18 **January** we joined forces with the Sydney Summer Series that runs successfully from October through to March. Our Rushcutter's Bay map did us and 189 competitors proud, this being the second time the map has been used for a SSS event.

In **February/March** we continued to run our popular summer Illawarra Map Running Series showcasing many runnable areas around the Illawarra region. The competition is aimed at newbies and regular orienteers alike to spend an hour or so getting to know the local area. It's a lowkey fun event for all. For newcomers we continue to offer a free club membership if they participate in 3 out of 4 events.

Atrocious wet weather impacted on our middle-distance State League event at Belanglo State Forest in **April** but as always as organiser we kept smiling and grew webbed feet for the day. Competitors that took part were keen to compete no matter the cold wet weather and finished their courses literally singing in the rain.

June saw us return to Yeramba Lagoon for #3 in the metroleague competition. With the map having been extensively updated and re-mapped since 2022 by IKO club members, the far western part of the map was included in the longer courses.

In September we hosted an event as part of the SHOO Forest Series using their Appin map. Again the area was field worked by our club members and the map updated. With a good rollup on Father's Day many families and groups took the opportunity to stretch their legs. Everyone seemed to enjoy the experience on this warm spring day. Cake for everyone was the reward at the finish desk – a real winner!

Later in **September** the RFS Cadets Championships was held on the same map. Cadets from all over Australia came to compete against each other in this fun activity. IKO, SHOO and GO members helped to set up and showcase our sport to the 120 keen cadets who took part.

As a joint venture each year in **October/November** we also co-host the River & Bay Orienteering Series with Uringa and Stingers using maps around the Cooks River and Bays in the southeastern suburbs. 2023 proved to be a productive year for Uringa.

New Website. The club launched a new and more user friendly website in April. The technical work was done by club members Paul Jones and David McKenna, with contributions from the Board and other members.

Events: Uringa hosted a range of orienteering events throughout the year. These included two Sydney Summer Series events which attracted the biggest entries of the season - 235 at Cabarita in February and 251 for the Balmain event in March, which celebrated Sydney WorldPride 2023 and pioneered non-binary gender classes in orienteering. On 10 February the club held a NSW Seniors Festival event at Birrung Park in Balmain, hosted in conjunction with the Inner West Council. Club Activities: WaggaRoos conducted 20 orienteering events during 2023 which, although a significant increase after the disruptions caused by Covid 19, was about

80% of what was conducted annually pre-covid. The reduction was necessary to match available man-power. Of the 20 events conducted, 6 were Summer Series events, 9 were local bush events including one CATI event, and 6 were conducted as part of the Interclub Challenge against Albury-Wodonga (which the events). WaggaRoos again organised the Riverina Schools Orienteering Day. 222 entries were received, and 192 students from 9 Riverina schools from Cootamundra to Coleambally participated, making it the largest day in its 13-year history. The enthusiasm of the participants, their courtesy, and great weather all helped make this a wonderful day. Many thanks to Ron Pallas, Gayle Shepherd and Lyn Malmgron who came from Sydney; Peter and Nick Mousley, Rob Simmons and Norm McCann who came from Albury/ Wodonga; and Robert Caldwell and Annie Gibbs who came from Benalla to help WaggaRoos with the conduct of the day. It was busy but ran remarkably soothly. While all those who participated are considered winners, there were some great performances from WaggaRoo juniors - Ryder Seaman 1st B10-11 years; Logan Seaman 2nd B10-11 years (and he was just 8 yrs old!); and Rob McDougall 1st B14-15 years. Subsequently, WaggaRoos was approached to organise a similar day for Home-Schooled children. 31 between the ages of 6 and 16 years participated enthusiastically.

Three Map-Run events were conducted in January-February as the second part of the 2022-23 Summer Series. The Map-Run format had been adopted to try and improve declining attendance at Summer Series events. It did not result in any increase in participation nor a decrease. 

ONSW JUNIOR PARTICIPATION AWARDS

The NSW Junior Awards are awarded annually for regular participation in orienteering events, for children aged 15 and under. Points are awarded on the following basis:

- ALL JUNIORS Participation in a major event (State League, Easter, Australian Champs)
 = 10 points
- REGIONAL CLUB JUNIORS Participation in a club or minor event (eg Summer Series, Metro League) = 10 points
- STANDARD CLUB JUNIORS Participation in a club or minor event (eg Summer Series, Metro League) = 5 points

The awards given are Waratah Award - 100 points, Banksia Award - 75 points, and Wattle Award - 50 points. 46 junior members qualified for Junior Participation awards in 2023. Although this was a small decrease of three from 2022 (49), it is very pleasing to note that more juniors qualified for the prestigious Waratah Award having earnt 100 participation points.

OTHER AWARDS

Orienteering Australia Hall of Fame – Athlete Division: Tracy Marsh (BF)

Tracy Marsh nee Bluett was inducted into the OA Hall of Fame – Athlete Division in 2023. An Athlete Member is someone who has competed and achieved high level success at the top level of competition in World Championships, medal level performances in World Masters competition and long term high level success in elite competition in Australia.

Tracy's outstanding international orienteering career extended over a remarkable fourteen years (1991 – 2005), with breaks for the HSC and for her first child. She was, and is, a role model for female orienteers and continues to compete and to contribute to the sport (most recently as a member of OA's Senior Selection Panel).

Tracy competed in five World Championships and four Junior World Championships. She competed at the elite level in many Australian Championships, achieving elite champion twice in the Long Distance and once in the Middle Distance.



Orienteering Australia Hall of Fame – General Division: Nick Dent (CC)

Nick Dent was inducted into the OA Hall of Fame – General Division in 2023. A General Member is someone who has demonstrated excellence and outstanding achievement in roles supportive to orienteering participants (administration, coaching/training, event organisation, mapping, and officiating).

Nick has served Australian orienteering for over 25 years in coaching, controlling and event management. His commitment to ensuring that high standards are understood and achieved in all aspects of the sport has been an essential part of Australian orienteering at international, national, NSW and club level.

Nick served four times as Team Coach for the Australian Junior World Orienteering Team. Nationally he has held appointments as OA High Performance Manager and as Head Coach. He is a Senior Event Advisor for the International Orienteering Federation and has had controller responsibilities at three national events. He has also held senior event management roles for several international orienteering events held in Australia and several national events. Nick is continuing his hard work as a Carnival Director for the 2024 Australian Orienteering Championships Carnival.

OA Silva Award for Services to Orienteering – Helen O'Callaghan (BnB)

Helen O'Callaghan was awarded the 2023 OA Silva Award for Services to Orienteering. Recipients of this award have rendered meritorious services to the sport of orienteering at club, State, and national/international level over a period of many years.

Helen's outstanding leadership and collaboration at all levels, including across state boundaries, are underpinned by her passion to increase participation in orienteering, especially juniors. Her development work in orienteering is founded on a clear understanding that both competency and social connection are essential.

Helen was instrumental in the planning, promotion and conduct of increased junior orienteers' participation in the 2022 Australian Orienteering Schools Championships experience, the 2022 All Australian Junior Development Team. She continues to work in collaboration with colleagues from other states to build on that experience for upcoming championships, essential for the future of orienteering in Australia.



Sport NSW Community Sports Distinguished Long Service Award – Terry Bluett (BN)

In 2023 Terry Bluett was recognised by Sport NSW with a Distinguished Long Service award to orienteering. For 37 years Terry has actively supported both newcomers and experienced orienteers in their enjoyment of the sport, athletic success, and connection to the orienteering community at club level and beyond. Terry works to ensure club members connect with each other and feel a sense of belonging. He has (with wife Cheryl) a history of taking 'newbie's under his wing socially as well in orienteering, including many orienteers new to Australia or visiting from overseas.

Terry was key to Bennelong Northside Orienteers growing from the tiny club his family joined when they started orienteering in 1986 to the thriving club it is today. He was Club President for 17 years (the longest serving) and in 2022 the club altered its constitution to include Honorary Life Membership, then was then awarded unanimously to Terry.

Terry strives to ensure orienteering competition runs smoothly at every level where he contributes. He has twice been recognised as NSW Course Setter of the Year. His behind-the-scenes work is his most substantial contribution. Since 1986, Terry has made over fifty orienteering maps including those used for the 1996 and 2021 Australian 3-day Carnivals. He has taught other championship mappers the skills of computer-based mapping. Despite being a competitive orienteer, Terry usually sacrifices the opportunity to race at his club events to instead run the computer result system.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

As outlined in the ONSW Constitution, the ONSW Board is elected at the Annual General Meeting. Duties of the Board include administering and managing the affairs of ONSW, to report regularly to members on achievements and to oversee the pursuit of strategic objectives endorsed by ONSW.

ONSW BOARD

The ONSW Board met via Zoom thirteen times in 2023, including for two Extraordinary Board meetings. The Annual General Meeting was held in May 2023.

Online meetings have enabled more members of the ONSW Board as well as other ONSW members to attend OA workshops and meetings, including occasional consultations and the traditional end of year conference workshops.

In 2023 the Annual OA Conference was held as four online workshops during November/December. The topics covered reflected the OA Strategic Plan: Great Events; Great Performances; Great Relationships; Great Opportunities; and Great Organisation. ONSW was represented at each workshop.

ONSW members also serve orienteering through their paid and volunteer roles with OA.

FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

MARK SCHAEFER

ONSW is currently solvent and able to pay its bills.

Principal Activities

Orienteering NSW Inc. is a State Sporting Organisation. The principal activities of ONSW are to act for, on behalf of and for the benefit of members in the promotion of the sport of orienteering in NSW. No significant changes to the principal activities of ONSW occurred during the reporting period.

Tax and Dividends

ONSW is exempt from paying income tax under section 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act, 1997. ONSW does not pay dividends and its income and property are applied solely towards the promotion of its objects. The Association is registered with the Australian Tax Office (ATO) for GST. With gross receipts exceeding \$250,000, ONSW is classified as a Tier 1 association and is required to submit audited financial statements each year to members at the AGM.

Results

The results show a deficit for the financial year of \$10,376, which is a smaller deficit compared to the previous financial year (\$17,375). A decrease in overall revenue was offset by a decrease in costs.

The Association remains in a reasonably strong financial position, with net assets of over \$160,000. Cash is down over the year, due to the requirement to expend all NSW Office of Sport grant funds prior to 31 December 2023.

There was one change in accounting policy that impacted the financial statements, being the recognition of Long Service Leave now being on an accruals basis. This resulted in a one-off recognition of \$12,177 of Long Service Leave expense, and a corresponding liability.

The Provision for Self Insurance (which acknowledges the future potential cost of replacing ONSW equipment not covered by our insurance policy), is shown in the financial statements as the Equipment Replacement Reserve.

Grants

Grants from the NSW Office of Sport, continued to be a major source of funding for both short and longer-term projects. The Sport and Recreation Support grant, initially received in 2020, was fully expended prior to the end of the year. Initiatives that continued from the prior year were the General Manager position, the outsourced accounting function and the redevelopment of the website, which unfortunately did not see completion. The acquittal of these funds sees a closure of this grant. The total available by ONSW over the 4 years was \$214,000.

ONSW also received \$20,000 (ex GST) from the NSW Office of Sport through its Organisation Support Grant program. This grant rises to \$50,000 (ex GST) for 2024, but with different usage/acquittal criteria.

The Board is grateful to the NSW Office of Sport for the funds that enable development projects to be undertaken for the benefit of the sport of orienteering.

Event Levies and Sporting Schools

ONSW derives a significant source of income from event levies. The 2023 calendar year brought in \$137,396 in levies and event fees, which was significantly higher than 2022, up 29%. Participation at around 22,000 entries was back to around pre-Covid levels.

The other source of income for ONSW is the Australia Sports Commission's Sporting Schools program, along with other Schools programs. Revenue from these sources rose to around \$85,000, an increase of 12%. However, this is offset by higher costs, such as the increased coaching rates adopted by ONSW from the middle of 2023.

Membership Revenue and Donations

ONSW is grateful for the continued support from members. With membership fees of \$42,886, membership revenue was healthy and only marginally lower than previous year.

ONSW utilised the Australian Sports Foundation (ASF) fundraising platform to allow tax deductible donations to be received in relation to the NSW Schools Teams attending the Australian Schools Orienteering Championships. After taking into account the ASF administration fees, donations of \$15,639 were received in 2023. This is an incredibly generous gift from the orienteering community, and ONSW extends its gratitude to the donors who contributed to assist the Schools Teams' athletes attend the Championships in Western Australia.

Major Expenses

The largest expense for ONSW is salaries and related employment costs. With the General Manager leaving part way through the year, employment costs were down on the previous year. However, General Manager duties were still performed and remunerated on an interim basis for the second half of the year.

As mentioned previously, Long Service Leave was recognised for the first time for both of ONSW's employees. This initial recognition of leave had a one-off negative impact of \$12,177 on the financial performance of the Association.

Some major expenses were related to/covered by income streams. These include coaching and mapping expenses for Sporting Schools (covered by income from the same) and costs related to various NSW squads (covered by fundraising, parent contributions and donations).

Orienteering Australia membership registration fees (\$31,517) and event levies (\$15,992) were other major costs.

2024 and beyond

The new year financial results should be one of divergence from prior years. The Australian Championships should provide a significant revenue boost to the Association. These additional funds will be spent over several years to cover costs in the years between major carnivals.

In addition, ONSW will host the Sydney City Race which will provide another welcome source of entry fees.

The special pandemic funding from the NSW Office of Sport grant has been fully utilised to modernise and enhance the abilities of the Association. Initiatives and reforms established

during the pandemic years will need to be funded to ensure that ONSW can continue to provide services towards its strategic plan in the best interests of the sport in NSW.

Base-line funding from the NSW Office of Sport will increase in 2024 from \$20,000 to \$50,000, but the funds will need to be spent on different projects compared to prior years funds.

ONSW is facing increased costs, such as the higher Orienteering Australia levies, increased insurance premiums, and the desire to remunerate the coaches and mappers that provide the back-bone of our development programs. As such, an increase and re-categorisation of the event levies to clubs has been implemented for 2024.

NSW BLUEBOTTLES



ONSW Juniors who wish to pursue orienteering as a sport are encouraged to join the NSW junior squad, known as the Bluebottles.

The Bluebottles were able to enjoy three state training camps and two national camps in 2023.

The year started with the National Training Camp, based in Hadspen, northern Tasmania. Six NSW juniors and three adults participated in this camp.

In March the first training camp was held in Sydney in preparation for the Sydney Sprint Weekend the following weekend. Attendees started the camp by participating at the Saturday Orienteering Series event being held at Cherrybrook. Sprint training sessions were then held Saturday afternoon and most of Sunday at Baulkham Hills and Pyrmont respectively.

In April a training camp was held in the Hunter Valley with a focus on girls and women. It was led by female coaching staff and female presenters. The training activities focused on the learning styles of girls and women, and included plenty of opportunities for social connection. Boys were also able to attend the training camp and were coached separately. The camp comprised 2.5 days of orienteering skills training before concluding with participation in a Newcastle Orienteer of the Year event at Kitchener.

In June, students from ten of our NSW Clubs were named in the NSW 2023 Schools team for the 2023 Australian Schools Orienteering Championships in Western Australia.



Juniors not planning on travelling to WA were still welcome to attend as long as they met the age and navigation ability criteria. Younger juniors were also able to attend part of the camp with their parents.

All of our camps were made possible by the assistance provided to us by parent volunteers, coaches, presenters and clubs that assisted with venues and permissions. The Bluebottles would like to thank all camp volunteers.

In September, NSW won the Teams Trophy at the 2023 Australian Schools Orienteering Championships as Champion State, successfully defending the title held in 2022 and 2019. At the conclusion of the 2023 Australian Schools Championships an Australian Schools Honour Team was announced. Of the twenty athletes named, six were from NSW.

The final camp for 2023 was another National Junior Training Camp, this time in Beechworth, Victoria. This time we had a huge contingent of NSW juniors attending the camp, with 26 juniors taking part. We also contributed many adult volunteers to the success of this camp.

In order to facilitate the affordability of participation in our camps and the Australian Championships, the Bluebottles undertook a large fundraising effort throughout the year. A huge thank you is overdue to our fundraising committee – especially Paul Sweeney and Steph Nicholls. They each took on huge roles with our food and drink stalls at events, our very successful Trivia Night, and our Australian Sports Foundation fundraiser. Many other adults supported our fundraising via donations of time and goods, transporting equipment, and encouraging their juniors to bake and serve. Thank you to all volunteers and supporters.

NSW STINGERS



Orienteers competing in the National Orienteering League (NOL), Australia's interstate competition for elite orienteers, represent New South Wales collectively as the Stingers. Skills and fitness level rather than age determine whether an orienteer runs in an elite class. The 2023 NOL had a variety of races with Sprint, Middle, and Long Distance as well as Individual Sprint Relay Knockout and Forest Relay. These were spread across four rounds in Tasmania (Launceston/St Helens), NSW (Sydney Sprint, and Easter Jindabyne) concluding with Victoria (Castlemaine).

It was a big year for the NSW Stingers in the National Orienteering League (NOL) as they took three of the four team titles. While the Senior Men did not have any of the three leading individuals, they had three strong results in most rounds and were rewarded for such depth and excellent results with a comprehensive victory in the team category. Both the Stingers' junior teams also won. The junior women were as dominant as possible, winning every round with three of the top four individuals. The junior men also had a useful lead for much of the season, so even with an under-strength team and having to rely on other team's results their lead in the point score could not be overcome. The senior women were not as strong in 2023 but with our junior women regularly providing exceptional performances the future is looking promising.

In the NOL Individual titles, NSW orienteers secured two titles in Junior Men and Junior Women. No junior man won more than two races in the season, but Sam Woolford got enough other results to keep the rest of the field at arm's length. Second in the final event was enough to hold off David Stocks, who finished fast with wins in the last two rounds (and missed two scoring opportunities through being a planner for Easter). There were many

scenarios for the final round for the junior women with seven having a mathematical chance of winning, but Eszter Kocsik had a comprehensive race win, giving her the title ahead of Stingers teammate Erika Enderby.

Our top ten and best placed in each individual NOL category were: Ewan Shingler 4th and Julian Dent 10th in Senior Men; Rebecca George 11th in Senior Women (ONSW member Emily Sorenson 4th running for Southern Arrows); Sam Woolford 1st, Cooper Horley 5th and Oskar Mella 9th in Junior Men; and Eszter Kocsik 1st, Erika Enderby 2nd and second Nea Shingler 4th respectively in Junior Women.

In total, 35 NSW orienteers were designated as Stingers in 2023, ranging in age from 16 to 61 years old.

The Stingers are self-funding; funds raised are used to reduce the cost of competing for athletes. Stingers contributed to event management for the River and Bay Series. This is in addition to the contributions they individually make to their respective clubs and to Orienteering Australia.





ORIENTEERING IN SCHOOLS

Development Officer Coordinator's Report for 2023

Sporting Schools

It's a bit of a mixed bag when looking at the statistics for Sporting Schools in 2023. The total number of visits by coaches to schools is back up to pre-COVID levels at 172, and the number of teachers attending workshops is up by nearly 50% on 2022, with a minor increase in participations. On the downside, the total number of programs is the 2nd lowest at 39, and the total number of participants is down for the 3rd year in a row. Let's look at what lies behind the numbers:

- A Year 9 & 10 trial was introduced in 2023 which was time consuming to administer as we
 were developing the program material and structure as we went along. Some programs did
 not eventuate after prolonged discussions, and those that did proceed were low in
 participant numbers, and therefore low in participations. The higher the age, the lower
 number of participants seems to be the trend.
- The quarterly reports to the ONSW Board show that the number of primary school programs is down by 25% on 2022 and the number of high school programs is up by more than 30% on 2022. High school programs are more difficult to schedule with less flexibility resulting in less participants compared to primary schools.
- Some of our more established coaches are not as available as they once were, such as the Enderbys in Newcastle experiencing a boom in their mountain bike programs since COVID, and others in Sydney taking holidays overseas. We have had to say no to more schools because we don't have coaches available.
- The stream for new coaches in schools is not as established as it once was, with the national coaching curriculum and structure changing over the last couple of years, and the Orienteering Learning Centre recently introduced. The School Sports Unit have less funding, so have not been able to put on 3 workshops a year for teachers and are waiting for our new coaching syllabus and framework to fit their new workshop formats.

Projects - ongoing

SI Droid – 4 more SI Droid kits have been assembled ready to be distributed to NSW coaches, in addition to the 9 SI Droid kits currently available, with Johnny Petersen again providing the expertise to purchase and assemble.

Sydney West Schools Training – It was hoped to communicate with schools in Term 4 on 2023 training dates but this will have to wait until Term 1 2023. The aim of this project is to have students prepared for their regional champs before the event, reducing the need for coaches on the day.

Coach Packs – The final laminations are taking place in January 2024 ready for distribution.

Associate Groups – This ONSW project for the development of scouts or school groups was drafted for inclusion by the Board but was put on the back burner in 2021, abandoned in 2022, but restored over Christmas 2023 when a Jindabyne school enquired about starting their own club.

Admin and other initiatives

Coach In Residence – There has not been activity in ONSW to initiate a new Coach In Residence.

OMaps – School maps have been uploaded to Omaps over Christmas 2023 so are currently up-to-date. This is an ongoing task.

Corporate & Community

Working With Children Checks & Office of Children's Guardian – Background task for coach and mapper access to schools that has grown in importance with the National Integrity Framework. The first audit for compliance is due in 2024.

NSW Rural Fire Service – The national RFS program in September 2023 for Cadets at Appin was very successful. The national event runs every 2 years and the RFS have requested ONSW to run orienteering events again in 2025.

Metro South Scouts – A follow up event to the one in 2017 at Earlwood in south Sydney was held in 2023, and Metro South have said that once every 6 years would fit their busy schedule.

Sydney Pride – Support to Uringa for 2023 Sydney Pride event as part of Sydney Summer Series. Discussions were held with Pride In Sport about ONSW becoming members but it was too costly to consider.

Cumberland City Council – Introductory event during school holidays in Term 1 was successful in that new locals attended with local club representation, and a follow up took place in Term 2 holidays.

Bring It On Sports – Discussions with BIOS led to an agreement to draw up a Memorandum of Understanding in 2022, with no progress in 2023.
